





Emergency Management Information and Resource Package



June 2024

PURPOSE: This document was created by the Ministry of Education and Child Care as a package of emergency management resources that district and school administration as well as child care operators can use to support planning and response. Resources included in this package can be shared with school districts, independent schools, communities, families, and educators.

INTENDED AUDIENCE: District and school administrators, independent school administrators, Child Care Operators, Ministry of Education and Child Care staff.

Emergency Management	
<p>Climate change increasingly affects our communities through climate-related events, such as wildfires, floods, and extreme heat events. These events require significant preparation and response efforts. In supporting emergency planning, the Ministry encourages the use of the following:</p>

<p>Master of Disaster – Youth Emergency Preparedness</p> 	<p>A free classroom program designed to help students in Grades 4-8 learn about emergency preparedness, including floods, wildfires, earthquakes, and tsunamis.</p>
<p>Emergency Management and Climate Readiness – Emergency Ready Planner</p>	<p>Website hosting an online tool to help families create a personalized emergency ready plan.</p>

<p>Public Safety and Emergency Services - Find wildfire recovery resources</p>	<p>Website provides recovery resources available for families, individuals, businesses, and communities impacted by wildfires. Resources include support services information, health resources, information for residents and visitors, disaster recovery resources, and current emergency information.</p>
<p>Emergency Support Services</p> 	<p>Website provides information about registering for emergency services including through the Evacuee Registration and Assistance (ERA) tool.</p>
<p>ChildCareBC Maintenance Fund</p>	<p>Website provides information for child care facilities impacted by emergencies such as wildfires and floods that may be eligible for assistance through the ChildCareBC Maintenance Fund.</p>



Heat Events

Climate change is causing more heat events. Schools and child care centres are encouraged to inform their school communities about the potential risks of heat events, and to take precautions to ensure the safety and well-being of staff, students, and children. In addition to the resources below, your local municipality and regional health authority may have information to support planning and response.

School districts identifying cooling as a priority in their existing schools can submit requests for funding through the Ministry’s School Enhancement Program or Carbon Neutral Capital Program, as part of the annual 5-year capital plan submission process. In addition, the Annual Facility Grant can be used toward elements (HVAC upgrades, etc.) to adapt to and mitigate climate change.

<p>BC Centre for Disease Control - Preparing for Heat Events</p>	<p>Website provides information to understand and identify heat alerts and emergencies; outline who is at higher risk from heat and how to prepare before extreme heat; and understand how to take care during heat events and the signs of heat illness.</p>
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<p>Public Safety and Emergency Services BC - Be prepared for extreme heat and drought</p>	<p>Website defines extreme heat and its connection to climate change and provides steps to take before summer season, including identifying those most at risk and planning for extreme heat events. A guide for understanding alerts shared by Emergency Info BC and Environment Canada is provided, along with links and resources.</p>
<p>Prepared BC - Extreme Heat Preparedness Guide</p> 	<p>Guide includes information about getting prepared for extreme heat events and what to do as temperatures rise. <p>BC Provincial Heat Alert and Response System (BC HARS): 2024</p> 	<p>Document contains information about heat events and criteria for the two alert levels: 1) heat warning and 2) extreme heat emergency.</p>
<p>Safe and Healthy Schools BC- Preparing for Heat Events</p>	<p>Website outlines steps that schools can take to plan for heat events to support the safety and comfort of students and staff. Identified actions include closing blinds, using cooling systems, ensuring access to drinking water, and encouraging sun safety.</p>
<p>Child Care Facilities and Heat</p>	<p>Factsheet created by Vancouver Coastal Health to support child care centres to prepare for and respond to extreme heat situations.</p>

Drought

Impacts of climate change are significant and unpredictable, with many communities experiencing drought conditions during warmer months. We encourage everyone, including school districts and child care providers, to do their part in conserving water during drought conditions. Water conservation is everyone's responsibility.

<p>Help Starts Here</p> 	<p>Website through the Ministry of Mental Health and Addictions providing information about over 2600 resources for British Columbians in need of mental health or substance use support.</p>
<p>Kids Help Phone - Mental Health and Wellness Support Information</p> 	<p>Pamphlet created by the Kids Help Phone with information on how to access confidential mental health and wellness support, including for those affected by wildfires. Kids Help Phone is available 24/7 to anyone (youth or adult) and provides free online mental health services through text, phone, or online chat.</p>

Child Care

Each Health Authority has resources available to support child care centres in an emergency or in areas affected by climate events who may need support. The Ministry of Education and Child Care is also available to support child care centres experiencing emergency events, such as sudden closures, that may affect funding.

Independent Schools

<p>As part of Ministry of Education and Child Care inspections, independent schools are required to demonstrate emergency response planning aligned with Ministry procedures. In the event of an emergency, independent schools and authorities are requested to inform staff at the Ministry of Education and Child Care and at the Federation of Independent Schools Associations in British Columbia (FISABC).</p>
